Both girls will now begin a gruelling four month rehearsal culminating in a West End performance of The Little Princess at the Peacock Theatre.


First published in 1905, The Little Princess follows the story of Sara Crew, a young girl born to a wealthy soldier in India who is brought to London for a formal education in the late
